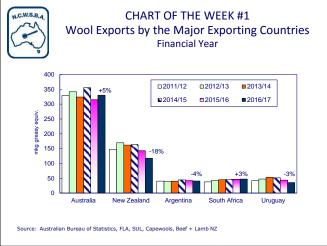
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The Australian wool market had a topsy-turvy week, with prices dropping on Wednesday, with some microns falling very sharply, before a solid rally for Merino wool on Thursday. The Eastern Market Indicator finished the week at 1558 c/kg, down by 14 cents. Wool of 17.5 microns and finer actually increased over the week and 18 micron was virtually unchanged, thanks to higher prices in Sydney which hosted a designated superfine sale. Broader Merino wools declined by 12 to 40 cents, while Crossbred wools were also down by between 28 and 40 cents. The Merino Carding Indicator fell by 19 cents. The Northern Market Indicator slid by 14 cents to 1558 c/kg, the Southern Market Indicator was down by 13 cents to 1509 c/kg and the Western Market Indicator fell by 71 cents compared with the previous sale a fortnight ago to 1609 c/kg.

The A\$ was a little higher against the US\$ and a little lower against the Euro over the week. The EMI closed at 1240 USc/kg (down 9 US cents) and at 1036 €c/kg (down by 19 €cents).

Data on exports from the five major wool producing and exporting countries for the full 2016/17 season shows that total exports fell by 3% compared with the 2015/16 level. [The five major wool exporting countries are: Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Argentina and Uruguay]. This is the second consecutive season that total exports declined and, at 572 mkg, the total export volume was the lowest in the past decade or more.

The first Chart of the Week shows the volumes of exports by each country for the past six financial years since 2011/2. As can be seen, exports from Australia and South Africa increased in 2016/17. Of course, these two countries are the major exporters of Merino wool, which saw strong demand throughout 2016/17. In contrast, exports from New Zealand and Uruguay, which both produce mainly broader Crossbred and Corriedale wool respectively, saw export volumes drop as demand dried up. The decline was particularly fierce for New Zealand.



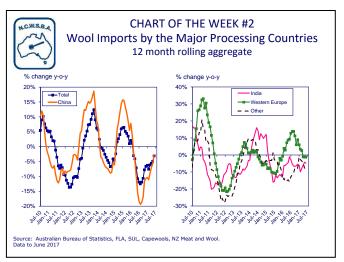
The second Chart of the Week shows the trends in exports to the major wool processing countries and regions. Export volumes to all the countries and regions shown were in the red for the 12 months to June



2017, although exports to Europe were only slightly lower. As can be seen, exports to China are firmly on the upswing.

There were some big differences in the export volumes by the five major exporting countries to China. Australia exported 10% **more** wool to China in 2016/17 than in 2015/16 and South Africa exported 3% **more** wool to China in 2016/17. In contrast, New Zealand exported 35% **less** wool to China in 2016/17 than in 2015/16 and Uruguay exported 38% **less**.

AWTA today released **the data on the volume of wool tested in August**. The data shows that the



total weight of wool tested in August was very slightly higher than for the same month in 2016. This brings the total weight of wool tested for the first two months of 2017/18 to 47.13 mkg, up 4.7%.

The **Australian Wool Industry Medals** were awarded for the first time at the Wool Industry Dinner last Thursday (24th August). There were 11 Medals awarded in recognition of men and women who have made an exceptional and sustained contribution to the Australian wool industry. The recipients came from all sectors of the industry, from wool industry leaders such as Robert Ryan OAM (wool broker and past FAWO Chairman), Barry Walker OAM (woolgrower and GIC Ltd chairman), David Ward OAM (past AWTA Managing Director) and Wal Merriman (Chairman of AWI), to those who have served the industry 'behind the scenes', including Athol Frederick (Landmark wool broker, Bendigo), Nan Allison (AWH administrator) and Robert Carter (wool classing lecturer from WA). I look forward to new nominations coming forward for the Medal for 2018.

The **FAWO Annual General Meeting** was held last Friday, which I attended. There were interesting presentations by Dalena White, the Secretary-General of IWTO, and by Peter Ackroyd, President of IWTO. Dalena outlined IWTO's activities in recent months, including a synopsis of the 2017 Congress in Harrogate earlier this year. She also noted that the Wool Roundtable this year will be held in Cape Town, South Africa on 6th to 9th December. The program includes 1 ½ days of conference activities and a visit to a wool and sheep property. Peter Ackroyd gave a presentation on the Campaign for Wool and the events planned this year in the UK between 7th and 22nd October. *If you would like a copy of Peter's presentation, please send me an email at chris.wilcox@woolindustries.org*.
